Brenda Davis, registered dietitian, is a **plant-based trailblazer** and an internationally acclaimed speaker. She has been a featured speaker at medical, nutrition, and dietetic conferences in 28 countries on 6 continents. As a prolific nutrition writer, Brenda has authored/co-authored 13 books with over a million copies in print. Brenda is currently working on her 14th book on plant-based diets for older adults. She has also authored and co-authored dozens of peer-reviewed and lay articles.

Brenda is a past chair of the Vegetarian Nutrition Dietetic Practice Group of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics. She was the lead dietitian in a type 2 diabetes randomized controlled trial in the Marshall Islands. In 2007, Brenda was inducted into the Vegetarian Hall of Fame and in 2022, she was the 7th recipient of the Plantrician Project's Luminary Award. Brenda lives in Calgary, Alberta, Canada.



October is Women's History Month in Canada, a time to highlight the achievements of women and girls, past and present, who have shaped Canada in fields like politics, science, arts, business, and the economy.

This month, we are featuring four women who made an impact in the early years of Burman's history. Our second featured female is Nellie Kathleen Shankel-Sharman.

Answering the Call: My Journey from Nova Scotia to Nyasaland

I was born in 1896 in a small fishing village called Hubbards Cove, Nova Scotia. My childhood was filled with laughter, the pull of the ocean tides, and the scent of sawdust from our fathers lumber business. My mother, a devoted Seventh-day Adventist, and my father, a hardworking Baptist, raised us with love, discipline, and deep reverence for God.

In 1908, my parents moved us across the country to the golden fields of Alberta. My mother's dream was for us to attend Alberta Academy, and she prayed earnestly that our lives would be rooted in faith.

In the early years I helped scrub the floors and prepare the house before sundown on Fridays, making sure everything was ready for Sabbath. I churned cream in the early mornings, tended to chores, and dreamed of the wider world God might one day call me to. I was educated at Alberta Academy where I met Clark, a kind and devoted man. He had walked away from comfort and even an engagement because he could not ignore God's call to the Sabbath. We met on the steps of the college library, and I knew in that moment that our paths had been placed together for a reason.

Together, we answered a call that took us far from home. For 17 years, we served as missionaries in Africa, in Nyasaland, Basutoland, and the Transvaal. Being a missionary taught me to trust God in ways I never expected. There were many trials: malaria and other diseases, words in languages I could not yet understand and the time it took to become fluent, and homesickness that pressed hard on my spirit. There were moments of humor too, like the day our servant boy dyed my laundry every color of the rainbow. And there were miracles, like the joy of bringing hope to families hearing the name of Jesus spoken with love for the first time.

Africa shaped our lives. My children were born there. Clark and I poured ourselves into the work we had been given, believing each day was part of God's greater plan. When illness finally brought us home, I was not finished. I served as assistant dean of women at Walla Walla College, returned to school in my sixties to renew my certification, and taught first grade until I was seventy-one years old.

I was never just a girl from the Cove. I was a servant learning to say yes, again and again, to the work God placed in front of me.

Looking back, I am most grateful for the yeses we gave God: yes to missions, yes to obedience, yes to a love rooted in faith. Whether across the ocean or across a hallway to a child who needed a lesson in grace, the call was always the same.

I am Nellie Kathleen Shankel-Sharman, the first woman trained at Alberta Academy to enter conference work. My life was marked not by detours but by endurance — seventeen years in Africa, a lifetime in classrooms, and a steady faith that never let go. My story is one of constancy, showing that God can carry a willing servant farther than she ever dreamed.



Outside of her professional work, Taffy enjoys rockhounding, traveling, and genealogy, passions that reflect her curiosity, love of discovery, and deep appreciation for history and connection.


